Mindful of the negative financial impact the Festival has had on the ELMC over the last 5 years the Board of the ELMC have started to prepare their plans to highlight and communicate the excellent work carried out by ELMC and its respective sub-committees across the whole of the membership in East Lancashire.

This in the hope that the ELMC will once again become the principal recipient of charitable giving from Lodges, Chapters and Individual membership.

I am pleased to report that the problem of reduced occupancy levels at Hewlett Court has been reversed and we now have all rooms occupied with a waiting list and steady flow of prospective residents visiting the home. The management and support team at Hewlett Court should be congratulated for their tremendous efforts and continued commitment in this respect.

You will recall that during the course of the Festival the ELMC ring fenced an amount of funds which could be distributed via the Community Fund Committee to Non Masonic Charities operating within East Lancashire. This with the aim of encouraging applications not only supported by the Lodges and Districts but ideally where Freemasons have continued involvement, creating an active Masonic profile in the local Community. This year the ELMC has made grants of in excess of £30K through this Committee to a variety of projects which has ensured that Freemasonry and the ELMC has received increased public awareness and positive publicity across the Province.

We in East Lancashire continue to receive considerable financial support from the National Masonic Charities, for which we are eternally grateful and look forward to their proposed consolidation into one body and the resulting operational changes with interest later in 2015.

As your President I take great pride in the fact that during the course of a 12 month period over 650 beneficiaries are contacted via the ELMC and receive a whole range of benefits which really does make a difference and demonstrates that "Freemasonry Cares".

In closing I wish to once again thank the Board, Chairman and Members of the Sub-Committees and our ladies in the Welfare Office for their continued efforts on behalf of the Charity, without their commitment our Charity could not provide this essential and important work.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The ELMC was incorporated on the 13th January 1904. The Provincial Grand Master of the Masonic Province of East Lancashire is a non-Executive Director and the President of the Charity. The Deputy Provincial Grand Master is also a non Executive Director and the Deputy President. The business and affairs of the Charity are directed by the Board of Directors/Trustees in accordance with the Articles of Association, and managed on a day to day basis by the Operations Director, Julie Ward, and part-time Administrative Officer, Karen Hall.

Voting Members, known as Representative Members, are appointed by each Lodge and Chapter of the Masonic Province of East Lancashire. Any person may become an "Individual Member" of the ELMC at the discretion of the Board providing they make a contribution of at least £60 per annum. These Members are entitled to attend the Annual General Meeting and to receive a copy of the Annual Report, but at the AGM are not entitled to cast a vote.

Three non-Executive Directors - including the Chairman of the Museum Committee, with an option for a total of up to five non-Executive Directors.

The President, the Deputy President, the Provincial Grand Almoner and the Provincial Grand Charity Steward are all ex-officio Members of the Board, other Members are elected at each Annual General Meeting.

Induction and Training of Members of the Board:

Upon appointment or election to the Board new Members receive the following:

- 1. Information explaining the extent of the involvement required
- 2. A copy of the Memorandum and Articles of Association of the Company
- 3. Copies of the most recent Annual Report and Accounts/Statement of Trustees' responsibilities
- 4. An explanation of membership of the Board
- 5. Copy of the Charity Commissioners Guide to the responsibilities of a Charity Trustee
- 6. Copies of the minutes of previous meetings of the Board

The Board appoints Sub-Committees, which are approved at the Annual General Meeting each year, to consider and make recommendations to it for the management of the Charity. The appointed Sub-Committees are:

The Committee of Benevolence consists of a representative of each of the Districts in the Masonic Province of East Lancashire together with other members nominated by the President or the Board. The role of the committee is to determine the provision of charitable assistance to needy Freemasons, their widows or other dependent relatives. The Committee of Benevolence operates two Sub-Committees' – the Comforts Fund Committee and Young People's Committee. Much of the work of the Benevolence Committee is co-ordinated with the Freemasons' Grand Charity in London to whom petitions are submitted for consideration.

Hewlett Court Advisory Committee whose responsibility is to offer professional support and guidance to the Director of Operations and Manager.

Community Fund Committee supports non-Masonic charities and other good causes that are proposed by Lodges and Districts within the Province of East Lancashire. It encourages the active involvement of Freemasons within their local communities.

The Investment Sub-Committee. The investment policy is to maximise the long term return on the Charity's Investment funds, subject to the risks normally associated with a balanced approach to portfolio management. The Charity does not restrict itself to any particular category of investment, and the performance of the funds is measured against appropriate benchmark indices. The sub-committee monitors the Charity's investments at regular meetings with advice taken from W H Ireland Ltd, its Stockbroker.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The Charity is the central vehicle for the delivery of Masonic charity and care on behalf of Freemasons in East Lancashire. It augments the charitable work of Freemasons in their Lodges and Districts by supporting those in need within the wider Masonic "family", eligible projects which benefit local communities and other good causes.

The specific objectives for which the Charity is established are:

- 1. The relief of poverty by the provision help and assistance to needy Freemasons, or their widows or any other of their dependent relatives, living predominantly but not exclusively in East Lancashire.
- 2. The education of children of needy or deceased Masons.
- 3. To make grants in cash or kind for the purpose of relieving the immediate and pressing needs of Freemasons or their families who live predominantly but not exclusively in East Lancashire.
- 4. To provide help and assistance to other charitable and good causes for the general benefit of the public or communities situated predominately but not exclusively in the East Lancashire area.

The Trustees confirm that they have complied with the duty in section 4 of the 2006 Charities Act to have due regard to guidance published by the Charity Commission on public benefit.

ACTIVITIES OF THE YEAR

The core activity of this Charity, since its inception over one hundred years ago, has been to support and care for the less fortunate within our Masonic and the extended community. The number of beneficiaries supported by the Committee of Benevolence and the Welfare Office was 662 in this financial year. In addition to the time given freely by Almoners, Charity Stewards and many other committed Freemasons, the financial value of the grants and support to those beneficiaries in the year amounted to £672,307 of which £535,802 was received from the Freemasons Grand Charity, the Royal Masonic Trust for Girls and Boys and the Masonic Samaritan Fund.

The Community Fund is now well established and is giving financial support to projects in which Freemasons are actively involved, bringing benefits which improve the quality of life in local communities. Through its £30K per year allocation it continues to make grants to local charities and good causes where comparatively small contributions make a considerable difference. In 2014 the Community Fund received 33 applications and issued grants to 29 organisations totalling £35,005. In addition, The Freemasons Grand Charity has given grants to 9 hospices in the Province totalling £23,576.

Hewlett Court, the residential home owned and operated by the Charity, continues to provide a happy and caring environment for its residents. The occupancy rate during 2014 increased to 100% (compared with 70% in 2013) of the accommodation which has a maximum of 44 residential places.

Julie Ward, Operations Director for ELMC and Hewlett Court, continues with the management and day to day activity of the Charity from her base at Hewlett Court.

During the year the membership of the Board and its various committees has been considered and the governance of the constituent parts of the Charity has been kept under review. As reported in previous years we continue to monitor the governance of the Charity and risk management at all levels of the operation.

The Committee of Benevolence (COB) meets on a regular monthly basis to consider petitions brought to them by Almoners and other concerned Brethren on behalf of Freemasons, their family and dependants who are thought to be in need, for either financial assistance or other types of support. Whilst financial assistance is the main area provided for, other requirements could be for decorating, repairs to their home, household appliances and special needs equipment to help improve the quality of life.

All petitions are considered first of all by COB and, where appropriate, are submitted to Grand Charity for further consideration. Due to the way in which Grand Charity now operates in London, all the different Charity organisations work together - Grand Charity, Masonic Samaritan Fund [MSF], Royal Masonic Trust for Girls and Boys [RMTGB] and Royal Masonic Benevolent Institution [RMBI] and a petition will be looked at by the appropriate committee(s). As you may be aware, major changes are under way to amalgamate all of the Charities into one larger combined operation.

In the last year the Grand Charity supported our beneficiaries with a sum of £148,130 and ELMC supported that by an additional sum of £24,398.

The total number of beneficiaries (at May 2015) was 654 comprising 93 Widows, 17 Brethren, 30 Married Couples, 3 Spinsters, 1 Bachelor, 67 Young People, 37 Residents of Hewlett Court and 406 Widows of Closed Lodges. It is this last figure which is getting larger by the month as more Lodges are forced to close and has risen by a nett 13 in the last year.

During 2014 there were 29 New Petitions for financial support, 124 cases were reviewed and 4 were made new beneficiaries of the Charity.

Although the Committee meets once a month, we aim to react as quickly as possible to any petition and by regular liaison with the Provincial Almoner and Provincial Charity Steward and their teams, supported by Julie Ward and Karen Hall, we will deal with all cases as urgently as they merit. We do have discretion to act on a case and have that decision discussed and ratified at our regular monthly meeting. Indeed, in the past year, we have dealt with 3 such cases and I am pleased to confirm that the subsequent committee meetings ratified what we had decided.

I have been Chairman since September 2013, having served on the committee for about 12 years first as a District Almoner and then co-opted. I have been wonderfully supported by the team at Hewlett Court (Julie and Karen) and ably assisted by all of the District Almoners, The Mark Degree Benevolence team and Brian Carter (your Provincial Almoner) to whom I give my very grateful thanks.

The Young People's Committee (YPC) organised seven events during 2014. The events comprised of mixture of new experiences and familiar events for the Beneficiaries. The school holidays set by the various local authorities within the Province of East Lancashire do not always coincide for all of the schools / colleges attended by our Beneficiaries this could be the reason why our Half-Term activities are not as well patronised as the main Holiday events.

The first event on 18th February 2014 was a visit to the National Cycling Centre at the Velodrome, Manchester. Eight boys and one intrepid Dad took up the invitation. The day was organised to give the participants an opportunity to ride on the Indoor BMX Track and the Mountain Biking Skills Zone. The Indoor BMX Track has been built to conform to international racing standards. It is challenging. Following collection of the safety equipment and bikes, our coaches laid out the rules and objectives of the session. After being taken through each section of the course, the final part of the session was putting it altogether, riding the full track. A buffet lunch gave the boys the opportunity to refuel, compare performance, falls and bruises. Mountain Biking (MTB) was the next session. The Clayton Vale Mountain Biking Trail and Skills Zone is the latest addition to the Velodrome's facilities. After collecting the bikes, helmets and gloves the instructors took the group out to the skills Zone. The Skills Zone is a range of Technical Trail Features. It is a whole new vocabulary, berms, drop offs, rock gardens, bunny hops etc, etc. After honing their skills on each section the final challenge was putting all the skills together and riding the full circuit. Before being collected by their parents everybody had the opportunity to view the indoor race track close up.

A visit to the A. J. Bell Stadium was the second outing of the year. On the evening of the 11th April a group of twelve children and parents watched Sale vs. Harlequins. Prior to the game the Sharks were lying fifth in the Aviva Premiership and a win would have given them a good chance of making the play offs. The result Sale 12 Harlequins 27. The YPC group were hoping for a Sharks win and cheered every Shark's attack. They were also excited at seeing so many of the current England Squad on the field that night, unfortunately most of them playing for the Harlequins.

Nineteen Young People accepted the Committee's invitation to participate in Winter Sports at the Chill Factor on the 15th April. Some of the young people have been attending this event since our initial visit five years ago and for some it was their first visit. We had organised a set of activities that would challenge all of the young people. After two hours of snow activities the Young People met at the indoor climbing wall for a further challenge. Could they climb to the top and ring the bell? The majority of the Young People donned the required safety equipment and took up the challenge. The climbing wall is segregated into sections which present an increasing level of skill and strength. Lead by the instructors the young people improved their skills and progressed through the levels during the session. After the climbing activities we adjourned to Nando's to satisfy the appetites created during the afternoon activities.

For the past four years the YPC has provided support for one of our families to compete in the National Archery Championships. The family members have achieved a high level of success in the Championships and Regional competitions. In 2014 one of family attained his instructor's qualification. To mark this achievement the family asked if the YPC would support them in organising a "Learn to Shoot" event at their archery club. On the 28th May twelve Young People, two parents and two committee members met at The Rochdale Company of Archers to use the indoor shooting range for an introduction to Archery. The first session was learning how to use the equipment, and how to aim and hit the target. It is not that simple. Strong arms and a steady aim are required. After the first session and a short break for refreshments we were introduced to the competitive part of the afternoon. The final competition was to hit balloons pinned to the target. This had a twist in that if a team had hit all of their balloons they could begin to take out balloons on the opposing teams targets. Before the event we had not realised that Archery could be so competitive and fun. After the event the group adjourned to the Royal Toby, Castleton for an evening meal. The verdict on the day "When can we do it again".

Trips to the theatre are always popular and a visit to see The War Horse at the Lowry Theatre 24th July 2014 was no exception. The performance we attended had many groups with young people in them so there was the possibility of having a boisterous audience; however the performance was so riveting that hardly a murmur could be heard during it. The play has had rave reviews from the critics and our beneficiaries would certainly endorse that. Even during the interval whilst they ate their ice-creams the talk was all about the play. At the end of the play (and not a dry eye in the house) the cast were given a standing ovation which we all enthusiastically joined in. The group then retired to the 'Bella Italia' for our post performance dinner. As usual during the meal most of the children sat together on their own table but we adults didn't feel too excluded, I think we're used to it now. We had a couple of new faces attending this time and it was nice to see how all the others enfolded them into the group from the start.

Blackpool Tower, The Illuminations and a Fish Supper, what could be better? The twenty one young people accompanied by TLC the Bear, fourteen parents / guardians and three YPC committee members couldn't think of a better way of spending a day out during the October Half Term break. On the 30th October our coach set off from Ashton-under-Lyne Masonic Hall at 09.00, followed by pick-ups at Hewlett Court and Blackburn with Darwen services on the M65. On arrival at the Blackpool Tower the group were dropped off at the promenade entrance to the Tower. After collecting a packed lunch and a "Big Ticket" giving entry to all of the attractions at The Tower, the party divided into groups and set out to enjoy the day. Blackpool was crowded but it did not diminish the excitement and enjoyment during the day. The groups managed to cram in visits to the attractions on offer. The Tower Eye, Skywalk, Dungeons, Madame Tussauds, The Ballroom, Jungle Jim's and Sealife were all visited throughout the day. TLC enjoyed his day out from Hewlett Court getting up close with the sharks at Sealife, Shrek, the best seat for the illuminations and his fish supper. The group met at 17.10 outside the Tower entrance to board the coach for a trip through the

"Lights" and then onto Seniors Restaurant, Thornton for a "Fish Supper". After the meal it was back on the coach for the return journey back to Blackburn, Hewlett Court and Ashton. On the journey home we were entertained by a sing-a-long of current hits and favourites from the musicals, lead by the Young People. We have a talented group.

On the 2nd January 2015 eighteen Young People accompanied by fifteen Parents / Guardians accepted the Young People's Committees invitation to attend a matinee performance of Shrek the Musical at the Palace Theatre, followed by a meal and Karaoke at Don Giovanni's Restaurant, Oxford Street Manchester. Everybody arrived on-time at the meeting point in the Palace Theatre and following the distribution of tickets all took their seats for the performance. At the interval all enjoyed the ice creams and talked excitedly about the first half and expectations for the second part. Shrek the Musical is a family friendly show with humour on all levels to keep the youngest and oldest in the audience entertained throughout. Everybody in the group enjoyed the performance and the shared experience of being in a group of friends. At the end of the performance all gathered at the meeting point outside the Theatre for the short walk to Don Giovanni's Restaurant. The meal and Karaoke were in the Function Room at the rear of the restaurant. The room had been had been lit by "Black Diamond Disco" (W. Bro. Kevin Hawley and his son Sam) creating a party atmosphere from the outset of the evening. After the first course had been served the entertainment began. The Young People don't need encouragement to participate in Karaoke. Even the youngest of the group impressed with a faultless rendition of a Taylor Swift track. The Girls took the lead on some tracks only to be challenged by the Boys on the rock tunes of Queen. Committee members were pressed into participation of Gangnam Style and other dance routines which some had never heard of. At the end of the evening all of the Young People received a selection box and a TLC Bear dressed in a YPC sweater designed and made by Karen Hall.

The Community Fund considered 35 applications during 2014; 27 grants were approved totalling £35,104.90. This was an increase of 12 applications over the previous year (when £30,150.18 was dispersed). This reflects increased engagement with our local communities and increased awareness of our members who are making greater use of the fund, particularly while the Province is in Festival.

'Teddies for Loving Care' provides Teddy Bears for children attending local Hospital A&E departments and Children's Courts throughout the Province. Grants are made available to

Districts to assist in purchasing Teddies. 4 applications were received in 2014 and grants totalling £2,800 were made.

From its launch in 2006 the Fund has approved grants to a total of £313,295.50. A full list is available on the ELMC's website.

Ed Cheadle retired as Chairman on 18th September 2014. We are grateful for his steady hand and contribution to the work of the Committee during his time in office. WBro Chad Northcott is proving a worthy successor. He has appointed two further members to the Committee - Peter Faulkner and David Lightbown. The Committee now has members from most Areas in the Province.

Some results of the work of the Committee are displayed on the website and are regularly communicated via various social media channels. There has also been good press coverage of many of the supported initiatives and publicity through the channels of those organisations we have supported.

We 'audit' two random cases each year, partly to confirm that funds have been used for the purpose they were given, and partly to obtain increased publicity from completed initiatives.

celebrations, Easter Bonnet Parade, outings and curry nights. The "Friends" also initiated the Summerhouse project with the help of Burnley & Pendle, East Ribble and Salford Districts.



In May the Brethren of Bolton and Farnworth Districts organised a dinner and entertainment at Hewlett Court for all the Residents.

In September the Brethren of Dormer St Margaret's Lodge kindly arranged for singer Tony Berry, of Houghton Weavers fame, to perform an afternoon concert for the residents. As well as telling jokes, which kept his audience very amused, Tony sang many favourites which the residents heartily joined in with.

An evening of Bonfire treats and fireworks was arranged for 5th November and along with the Residents, staff and families, the members of the local Community also joined us for the evening.

For the second year running the Christmas Fair taking place on 22nd November was a huge success. There was a special appearance from Father Christmas accompanied by his elves.

As always the Christmas and New Years celebrations were fantastic, a real party atmosphere. Entertainment was organised and a pantomime rendition of Scrooge was performed on New Year's Eve.

There were changes to the Management structure at Hewlett Court during 2014. The ELMC Board allocated overall control and responsibility for the day to day running of the home to Julie Ward as Operations Director. A new Committee was formed known as the "Advisory Committee" offering their professional support and guidance to Julie and her team.

The first meeting of the management committee was in February. The Chairman, W, Bro, Alan Smith reported that the ELMC Board had appointed a subcommittee to consider the future direction of Hewlett Court. This committee is still deliberating.

At the April meeting Harry spoke of problems with one of the boiler water pumps and also advised that the compensator, whilst working well, was under manual control. It was decided that automatic control would be an advantage. Harry would see to this.

June saw the resignation of Derek Worthington due to ill health; the Chairman had written to Derek thanking him for his commitment over many years.

W. Bro. A.D.P. Smith retired as Chairman in September and W. Bro. M. G. Boden took over that office, he explained the circumstances of his appointment to the committee and asked them for their support. The new chairman then announced that from now on Julie Ward would have full management responsibilities and the committee would continue in an advisory capacity. Meetings would be tri-monthly; dates to be decided on an ad hoc basis; usually about a week prior to the ELMC Board meeting. The next meeting will be in December to coincide with the meeting with the residents' representatives.

Two meetings a year are held with the representatives of the residents where they air their grievances or tell us how well we are doing. Thankfully there have not been any major problems to report.

Unfortunately we still do not have a treasurer on the committee. We are blessed with the expertise of the committee members Michael Williams, Harry Rodgers, Peter Jones, and Peter Bibby, and I would personally like to thank them for their unstinting hard work.

Thanks also go to the Districts of East Ribble, Burnley & Pendle and Salford plus the Hewlett Court comforts committee; Chairman W. Bro Charles Ward; who have covered the cost of the building of the new summer house. No labour costs were incurred as construction was undertaken by volunteers.

The Company continues to operate as a wholly owned subsidiary of the Charity and has prime responsibility for the running of Freemasons Hall, Manchester.

The Company has two main sources of income, those being Masonic business and non-Masonic business. The Masonic business comes from the hosting of Craft Lodges, Royal Arch Chapters and various side Degrees, as well as associated dinners, lunches, dining clubs and ancillary social functions.

The non-Masonic business consists of hiring out parts of Freemasons' Hall with or without associated catering services to non-Masonic organisations and individuals. This would include such events as breakfast meetings, training sessions, conferences, weddings and various social functions. Freemasons Hall has also been used on numerous occasions by television production companies for the making of television programmes.

The external works commenced in September 2014 and it was expected by mid-2015 all dining and business activities currently run by the Hall Company will become the responsibility of the new owners of the building and therefore there will be no need for the Hall Company to exist. With regard to the organisation of Freemasonry on the third floor, this will be run through a stand-alone non-profit making organisation that will basically be owned and run by the Freemasons who use the building in line with all other Masonic Halls in the Province. It will therefore not be a subsidiary of the Charity.

We continue to be extremely grateful for the hard work and dedication of an excellent and loyal group of employees, headed by Jon Fryer, the General Manager. The results achieved by Jon Fryer and his staff in extremely difficult trading conditions have been remarkable. All the staff under Jon have pulled together and have achieved results that far outweighed expectation. They are to be congratulated.

The Investment Committee meets on a regular basis to review the portfolio of investments, and aims to achieve a balance of capital appreciation and income return.

In the financial year, the value of our investments increased in value after allowing for capital withdrawals, with gains in equities offsetting falls in the government securities. Income during the period also fell marginally, as a result of those withdrawals but the total return was nevertheless positive at 3.54%

A warm welcome to our new member and hope you will carry on the good work and important duties that you have been appointed to.

The District Charity Stewards play an important role in promoting charity through the Lodges/Chapters in the Province of East Lancashire and non Masonic causes. This last year, as in previous years has not been easy with the Province still in Festival mode, nevertheless, whilst the Festival continues to grow in total (£) we are still seeing contributions to the ELMC, not as high as we would like but some contribution is better than none at all.

The message our Provincial Grand Master, Sir David Trippier continues to give out is that the Festival must take priority with the ELMC receiving what is available as a second choice and really non-masonic causes being asked to take a 'back seat' until the Festival reaches its conclusion.

Giving to Masonic causes, especially our own ELMC should always be a priority (except during a Festival) and during the year opportunities arise where we see and hear how hard our sub committees work to achieve giving relief to those less fortunate than ourselves. The District Committee meetings provide a platform for speakers from these sub committees i.e. Benevolence, Community Fund, Young Peoples Committee, Hewlett Court, to put over the needs and necessities of receiving charity donations for the amount of spend required to fulfil and satisfy funds that are required. It is the duty of the District charity Stewards to communicate effectively to the Lodges/Chapters the needs and requirements of why giving to charity causes is a necessity.

We are grateful of course to all the sub-committees for the exceptional work that they do each year on behalf of our beneficiaries, without them then the whole system would struggle to

cope in this day and age where people are living longer and the NHS is being overwhelmed with patients looking for medical support.

To the Honorary Secretary and Honorary Treasurer of the ELMC we offer grateful thanks for all their assistance and help given to the District Charity Stewards during the year and also for all the support given by the Welfare Team, Julie Ward and Karen Hall and the Staff at Hewlett Court, all of whom do a splendid job in providing back up for our cause.

The future does look that it is getting rosier and the Festival concludes in October of this year (2015), then the ELMC can look forward to claiming back its rightful place in our Masonic Charity organisation.

FUTURE PLANS

The core activities of the Charity continue to revolve around caring for our beneficiaries through the Committee of Benevolence, the Comforts Fund, Young Peoples Committee, and the Hewlett Court Management & Advisory Committees. The activities of each of these groups have been fully recorded previously in this booklet. These remain the most important areas of our activity and will continue to be our priority in the year ahead.

The decline in income and contributions continues to be a cause for concern but with the end of the East Lancashire 2015 Festival for the RMBI in sight (October 2015) the Charity has been planning to promote the excellent work of the various committees throughout the Province to ensure that the ELMC once again becomes the principal recipient of Charitable giving from the Brethren and Lodges from within the Province.

The ongoing investment and refurbishment of Hewlett Court will continue to ensure that the excellent standard of facilities and care provided for the residents are maintained.

The Community Fund Committee will continue to receive, consider and make grants to Non Masonic Charities throughout 2015 but with the planned completion of the RMBI Festival the future activities and operational guidelines of this committee will be reviewed and planned for 2016.

FINANCIAL REVIEW AND RESULTS FOR THE YEAR

FINANCIAL RESULTS

The reports and accompanying financial statements reflect the reporting requirements of the 'Statement of Recommended Practice – Accounting and Reporting by Charities 2005' (SORP) issued by the Charity Commission for England and Wales. These financial statements comply with the requirements of the Companies Act 2006, and the Company's Memorandum and Articles of Association.

This year it has again been a requirement that the results of the Charity be consolidated with those of its wholly owned subsidiary, the East Lancashire Masonic Hall Company Limited.

The Group's unrestricted total income was £1,507,982 in the year, compared with £1,595,214 in the previous year, a decrease of £87,232, which is explained in more detail below, whereas its costs increased from £1,690,559 to £1,700,192, resulting in a deficit of £192,210 in the year compared with £95,345 in 2013. The value of our investments increased by £54,997 compared with an increase of £132,836 in the previous year, thus the Group's total unrestricted net assets have decreased by £137,213 to £3.32 million.

It is the opinion of the Board that the Charity is in sound financial position and has sufficient assets and resources to enable it to continue to carry out its objectives as laid out on page 6.

THE CHARITY'S INCOME

The charity's total unrestricted income has decreased by £63,632 due to various factors but mainly due to a decline in Grants from Grand Charity, other incoming resources, rents receivable and legacies, for which we are grateful for the generosity of our departed Brothers. Improved Hewett Court income helped to mitigate the decrease. Donations from Freemasons, their Lodges and Chapters were down by £14,205. Investment income also reduced to £52,762 from £57,417 in the previous year. Other income decreased from £35,329 to £Nil.

The value of the investment portfolio has increased by £37,290 following investment changes in the year and an increase in underlying values. Your Investment Committee continues to monitor the position very closely.

THE CHARITY'S EXPENDITURE

Costs of the Charity have generally been contained (note 6). A reduction in costs, an increase in room rates and improved occupancy has resulted in an operating profit of £74,092 for Hewlett Court compared to a prior year loss of £9,039 and the depreciation charge has increased to £32,430 from £31,843.

HEWLETT COURT

As mentioned earlier in the report, occupancy rates improved during the year to full occupancy at the end of the year.

HALL COMPANY

The Hall Company's draft results have again been consolidated with that of the Charity. The income of the Hall Company decreased to £664,681 from £688,281 in the previous year. The costs increased from £686,457 to £765,651, see Note 7, resulting in a loss for the year after consolidation adjustments and tax of £97,427, compared with a profit of £4,642 in 2013. Tangible fixed asset impairment losses amounting to £58,318 are included within this result.

BALANCE SHEET

In the opinion of the Board the market value of the land and buildings is considerably greater than the book value. In view of the specialised nature of these assets, the Board considers that it is inappropriate to determine the market value. The total reserves of the Group and Charity are £3,346,883 and £3,447,049 respectively at the end of the financial year.

INVESTMENT POLICY AND PERFORMANCE

The present investment policy is to maximise the long term total return of the Charity's investment funds, subject to the risks normally associated with a balanced portfolio management. The charity does not restrict itself to any particular category of investment. The performance of the funds is measured against appropriate benchmark indices and during the year the result has exceeded all those benchmarks. The Investment Sub-Committee monitors investments with the assistance of the W H Ireland Ltd.

STATEMENT AS TO DISCLOSURE OF INFORMATION TO AUDITORS

So far as the trustees are aware, there is no relevant audit information (as defined by Section 418 of the Companies Act 2006) of which the charity's auditors are unaware, and each director has taken all the steps that he ought to have taken as a director in order to make himself aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the charity's auditors are aware of that information.

1 COMPANIES ACT 2006

The Charity is not a trading company and the Profit and Loss Account formats permitted under the provisions of the Companies Act 2006 are not considered appropriate to report the transactions of the Charity.

The Directors have presented the Income and Expenditure Account as part of the Statement of Financial Activities in a format which they consider fully explains the transactions of the Charity.

2 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(a) Basis of accounting

Subject to note 2(c) and 2(i), these accounts are prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) on Accounting and Reporting by Charities as Revised dated 2005.

The accounts consolidate the results of the Charity and its wholly owned subsidiary, The East Lancashire Masonic Hall Company Limited, on a line by line basis.

(b) Cash flow statement

The Group is exempt from the requirements to include a cash flow statement as part of its financial statements because it qualifies as small under the Companies Act 2006.

(c) Investment Income

Income from investments is recognised in the accounts at the date when it is received. This policy represents a departure from recommended accounting principles, which require income to be recognised in the accounts on an accruals basis. In the circumstances of this Charity, the directors consider it inappropriate to recognise this income until the date when it is due to be received. Other interest and rent receivable is accounted for on an accruals basis.

(d) Donations, legacies and grants

Donations, legacies and grants are recognised in the accounts at the date when these are received, as, in the opinion of the directors, it is not appropriate to recognise these at an earlier date. Grants and donations payable are recognised in the accounts at the date of authorisation.

(e) Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

2 ACCOUNTING POLICIES continued

(f) Expenditure

Resources expended are recognised on an accruals basis and are allocated to the particular activity where the cost relates directly to that activity. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to specific headings, they have been allocated to activities on bases consistent with the use of the resources. Governance costs are those incurred in connection with the administration of the Charity.

(g) Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. No depreciation is provided on freehold land and buildings. The buildings are maintained to ensure that their value does not diminish over time and their realisable value, although not quantified, is in excess of their book value. In these circumstances, the directors consider that any charge for depreciation would not be material and thus it is inappropriate to charge depreciation on these assets.

Depreciation is provided on other tangible fixed assets in order to write off the cost of each asset over its expected useful life at the following rates and bases:

Lift	5% per annum straight line
Improvements to leasehold property	5% per annum straight line
Plant and machinery	33% per annum straight line
	15% on reducing balance
Furniture, fixtures and equipment	10% per annum straight line
	20% on reducing balance
Office machinery	25% & 33% per annum straight line

(h) Deferred tax

A deferred tax liability is recognised in respect of all material timing differences that have originated but not reversed at the balance sheet date.

A deferred tax asset is treated as recoverable and therefore recognised only when it can be regarded as more likely than not that there will be suitable taxable profits from which the future reversal of underlying timing differences can be deducted.

(i) Investments

Listed investments are valued in the accounts at the mid-market price at the balance sheet date, including accrued interest where relevant. The surplus or deficiency arising from the valuation of investments is taken direct to the revaluation reserve. Unlisted investments are included at cost less provision for diminution in value. This policy represents a departure from recommended accounting principles, which require all investments to be included in the balance sheet at market value. The directors consider that it is not possible to establish with reasonable certainty the market value of the charity's investment in its subsidiary, without incurring disproportionate costs, which would not be beneficial to the charity.

Realised surpluses and deficits arising on disposals of investments determined by reference to the carrying value of the assets in the charity's balance sheet are included within Income and Expenditure for the year. Realised revaluation surpluses, representing the difference between historical cost and the carrying value of the assets, are reclassified by way of a transfer to general reserves in the year in which the disposal occurs.

(j) Hire purchase and leasing commitments

Assets obtained under hire purchase contracts or finance leases are capitalised in the balance sheet. Those held under hire purchase contracts are depreciated over their estimated useful lives. Those held under finance leases are depreciated over their useful lives or the lease term, whichever is the shorter.

The interest element of those obligations is charged to the statement of financial activities over the relevant period. The capital element of the future payments is treated as a liability.

The East Lancashire Masonic Hall Company Limited, a wholly owed subsidiary of the Charity, ceased trading on 31st May 2015. The subsidiary's draft accounts for the year ended 31st December 2014 have been prepared on the basis that the company is no longer a going concern and an impairment charge of £58,318 has been recognised to reflect the subsidiary company directors' opinion of the recoverable value of tangible fixed assets.
